

### We are 85 Years Strong



**DURING THE COOPERATIVE'S ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING** in May, board President Glenn Bange and I reported on the financial stability of the co-op and highlights of the last year. We've built a legacy to power the future, and I'd like to share a little of that history with you.

In the early years of the co-op, there were around 5,000 members between Gettysburg and Shippensburg, who each paid \$5 to join our rural electric system. Today, we serve more than 34,000 accounts in five counties. Our members remain our No. 1 priority, and we each play a role in the success of our cooperative's future.

We are owned by the members we serve. Therefore, we invest your money to provide reliable electrical service and maintain a financial reserve to keep rates stable. It's our mission to keep your rates competitive and to keep you informed about changes.

In the 1940s, electric bills for cooperative members were among the highest in Pennsylvania. It's one of the reasons the 14 cooperatives in Pennsylvania and New Jersey formed Allegheny Electric Cooperative, Inc. in 1946. By working together, co-ops could be a bigger player in the purchase of power on the open market. Years later, we were able to take ownership of some nuclear and hydroelectric resources, and today, our rates are among the lowest in the region.

Rates are something we talk about a lot in the community and in the boardroom. It's great that we're able to keep rates low, give you money back in Ownership Rewards and put an appropriate amount into maintenance programs to keep your reliability as high as possible.

We've made a lot of investments through the years to make sure our members have a person to talk to when they call the co-op. We've been helping our members through the Project Helping Hand program since 1985. This program allows members to help another who may be struggling to pay their electric bill.

We also send students on Youth Tour, a weeklong, all-inclusive trip to Washington, D.C., each June. In 2008, we created a committee to award high school seniors with scholarships for college. That program has grown, and today we help trade school attendees, college undergrads and adult members with their continuing education expenses. With no money taken from our rates, these programs are very well received.

In 2025, we introduced yet another program to help our membership. Working with New Hope Ministries, which has offices across our service territory, we launched a Hardship Fund that opens the door for members to apply for funding to help with their electric bills.

Another program saving our members money is the load management program, which has been in place since the late 1980s. The voluntary interruption of power flowing to water heaters and heating systems reduces our peak loads and, in return, we thank our participating members with a credit on their bill.

I prefer the new name for the program: U-Shift, U-\$ave. It can be a tongue twister, but it really explains what we're trying to do for the members. By shifting electric use to off-peak hours, they are saving money by delaying energy-intensive activities, such as washing dishes or running the clothes dryer, to less expensive times of the day. Since the program started, the co-op has saved more than \$30 million in avoided

## **Community Theater to Celebrate 75th Anniversary**

**DIAMONDS: THEY'RE AN EVERLASTING,** durable gem that can withstand the test of time. By the time a couple or a business celebrates its 75th anniversary, also known as the "diamond anniversary," it stands to reason they will also withstand the test of time.

In 2025, Totem Pole Playhouse is celebrating its 75th anniversary. The community theater, nestled in Caledonia State Park, started in 1950 and has been part of the region's art scene ever since.

The 2025 season runs through Aug. 31. However, the theater plans to celebrate its anniversary all year.

"The entire season is one big party," says Ryan B. Gibbs, producing artistic director. "No sad plays or slow musicals. There will be new types of programming for our community and a focus on productions that celebrate the joy and togetherness Totem Pole has fostered for generations. We're even restoring our iconic totem pole, which once stood as a symbol of our theater's unique charm."

The season has kicked off with "The Marvelous Wonderettes," a feel-good musical packed with hits from the 1950s



and 1960s. Next on the marquee is "9 to 5: The Musical," which is expected to break group sales



records. A fast-paced murder-mystery comedy, "The 39 Steps," will be next, followed by the inspiring Broadway hit, "Beautiful: The Carole King Musical." A playful nod to their anniversary — "Diamond: The Neil Diamond Tribute" — will close the season.

While the theater staff will celebrate all that has been accomplished in Totem Pole's 75 years of business, they will also focus on bringing new arts to the area.

"We've added a brand-new series called Tucked Away Tuesdays," Gibbs says. "It features smaller events like comedians, concerts and specialty programs throughout the summer. These are more intimate, one-night-only experiences that give the community something fresh between our big shows."

With new things on the horizon, Totem Pole will bring its annual holiday show to The Majestic Theater in Gettysburg. According to Gibbs, this year will feature the regional premiere of "Million Dollar Quartet Christmas," highlighting all the holiday hits of Elvis, Johnny Cash, Jerry Lee Lewis and Carl Perkins.

Adams Electric Cooperative has been a longtime Totem Pole supporter and show sponsor since both organizations share a common mission: being community-minded.

"Live theater is personal — it's storytelling with your neighbors," Gibbs says. "At Totem Pole, we bring in professional artists from around the country, but the heart of our work is local. And it's not just about entertainment — it's about connection, identity and investing in the culture of our region."

"Whether they're longtime fans or brand new, we've built this season with our central Pa. and northern Maryland community in mind," Gibbs says. "There's something for everyone — musicals, comedy, tributes, youth camps and more.

"We're affordable, accessible and a short drive away. Bring the kids, plan a date or make it a group outing. And thanks to generous local support, we're keeping ticket prices as low as possible and expanding our outreach so that every family has a chance to make memories at the playhouse."


